#### **Pilbara volunteers help keep the Flying Doctor flying**

Volunteers from the Pilbara region of Western Australia are continuing to help keep the Royal Flying Doctor Service in the air.

This week, being National Volunteer Week (May 9-15), reminds us just how valuable our many volunteers are for the Flying Doctor, RFDS Chairman Neville Bassett AM said.

“We are so grateful to all of our volunteers for the hard work they do, from fundraising in their local communities to organising local activities to raise both money and awareness,” Mr Bassett said.

“The contribution of our volunteers helps us to minimise our fundraising costs and ensure that more of the fundraising dollar goes directly towards our primary mission of providing aero medical care to Western Australians wherever and whenever they need us.”

Mr Bassett said in the last year, the RFDS had provided medical assistance to nearly 70,000 people through aero medical retrievals, telehealth consults and primary health care clinics across Western Australia - providing lifesaving intensive care in flight to 25 patients per day on average.

“That’s more than one person every hour of the day,” Mr Bassett said.

“The demand for our services is constantly growing and changing, and during the past 12 months the RFDS transferred 1,472 patients from the Pilbara region of WA, averaging around four per day.

“Many were children aged under 15 (of these, 13 were babies aged under 1 month).

“The largest number of patients transferred from the Pilbara region on a single day was 12.”

The RFDS responds to a range of medical conditions, the most common in the Pilbara region being as a result of injury and poisoning, while there were also a large number of cardiovascular patients.

During the past 12 months Port Hedland base crews flew a total of over 1.4 million kilometers and over 4,000 hours.

Mr Bassett said the Flying Doctors, during the past 12 months alone, flew over 9,000 sick and injured patients to hospitals across the state for treatment, and received over 41,000 telephone calls for medical assistance and advice.

“It is only due to the support of volunteers that we are able to continue to provide urgent assistance to people in need across our vast state wherever and whenever we’re required, 365 days a year,” Mr Bassett said.
