RIO TINTO LIFEFLIGHT HAWKER JET RETIRES

More than a decade ago, Rio Tinto and RFDS recognised the critical need to invest in a jet aircraft that could deliver exceptional aero medical capabilities with extensive reach across all 2.5 million square kilometres of our state.

Since entering service in October 2009, the Rio Tinto LifeFlight Hawker jet travelled approximately 4.5 million kilometres and assisted nearly 2,500 critically-ill patients before being decommissioned in January this year.

The New Year saw us pay tribute to our Rio Tinto LifeFlight Hawker jet based at Perth Airport, the aircraft retiring after coming to the aid of nearly 2,500 patients during its decade-long tenure. The decommissioning of the Hawker jet, coupled with the arrival of the second Rio Tinto LifeFlight PC-24 jet marks the completion of our integrated fleet and signals a generational shift in RFDS capabilities.

The introduction of two PC-24 jet aircraft to our fleet is a significant contribution to WA's wider health and emergency services infrastructure. We're looking forward to having greater flexibility when tasking crews to reach more people and communities who need us the most.

On behalf of the team and our patients, thank you for your ongoing generosity and encouragement. I look forward to sharing more with you throughout the year as we continuously strive to deliver the best response and outcomes for our patients across the state.

ARRIVAL OF THE RIO TINTO LIFEFLIGHT PC-24 JET

A WORLD FIRST FOR AERO MEDICAL SERVICE

When the first of two Rio Tinto LifeFlight PC-24 jets made its historic touchdown at Broome International Airport on Sunday, 2 December, it was not only a cause for celebration, it was a testament to innovation and tenacity.

Arrival events were held at both the Broome and Jandakot bases, bringing together RFDS and Rio Tinto staff, dignitaries, and business and community leaders. Guests applauded and cheered as RFDS Western Operations chief pilot Albin Unger disembarked on home soil.

The RFDS' acquisition and medical fit-out of two PC-24 jets is a world first for aero medical service and an investment of \$26 million, funded with the support of our major partner Rio Tinto (\$10M) and the Commonwealth Government (\$4.5M).

Since the arrival of the jet in Western Australia, RFDS pilots, engineers and medical teams have undertaken a comprehensive training program to ensure the jet's seamless entry into service and integration into the Western Operations fleet.

The second LifeFlight PC-24 jet arrived in Western Australia last month. The jets will be housed at the RFDS Jandakot and Broome hangars.

MEET TEAM DOWNER EAGLES

Armed with a network of corporate sponsors and a unique fundraising strategy, team Downer Eagles rallied their supply chain partners to raise nearly \$150,000 for the Flying Doctor.

Team captain Mark Mackay, an Executive General Manager at Downer Group, had heard about the Gibb Challenge through word-of-mouth while living in Perth.

Mark's interest was piqued and despite being transferred interstate for work, he kept up to date by subscribing to the Gibb Challenge's mailing list.

"I noticed the RFDS was the beneficiary and Downer has a footprint in regional and remote Western Australia so I decided to flag it internally with the CEO and it took off from there," he said.

Once the team was formed, Downer Group engaged an exclusive list of sponsors, encouraging them to donate \$10,000 in return for exposure on social media and their company's logo being displayed on team jerseys and support vehicles.

Mark said the social value of the event and being off the grid were definite highlights.

"I've done corporate triathlons but the Gibb Challenge is one of a kind – I'd do it again in a heartbeat," he said.

"The mix of participants is really good and everyone had a Flying Doctor story to share which made the journey really meaningful.

"I was able to get to know my colleagues better outside of work, the pressure of work was switched off and we could just enjoy giving back to the community."

Mark said Downer Group had established a new team for the 2019 event, encouraging others to go the distance both physically and philanthropically.

"The response has been very positive, I think it's really important to pass the baton on and connect others in the business with the cause."

After raising \$7000 for the RFDS in the 2018 Gibb Challenge, team 'Wonder Women' are back again to tackle the endless corrugations, dust, soft sand and water crossings along the Gibb River Road.

The Broome-based team of four friends were inspired to enter the Gibb Challenge after their partners returned from the 2017 event giving rave reviews.

One of the team, Roslyn, said: "The Gibb Challenge is one of those bucket list adventures which seems like a good idea when suggested over a few drinks down the beach!"

"Next thing you know, you've purchased the flash bike, the padded pants and have started fundraising for the RFDS.

"The reality hit us halfway through the first day when the easterly winds made the challenging terrain of the Gibb River Road even more gruelling."

Roslyn said completing the challenge was no easy feat, so they've been busy training in preparation for this year's event.

"Training has involved us riding out as a team to Roebuck Roadhouse, which is about 35 kilometres from Broome," she said.

"We have breakfast and we drive home.

"Some of the team are also members of the local gym and do indoor spin classes together.

"I have also been riding to school, but that is only about three-and-a-half kilometres so that doesn't really count.

"Living in Broome, we hear lots of stories of how the Flying Doctor has helped out people in their darkest hour. Luckily we haven't had to use the service, but it is reassuring to know they are there for us."


"We work off the grid, where we have to use a generator for power and satellite phones for communication," he said. "With the nature of the work we do, if anything were to happen, we have that peace of mind that the RFDS is there.

"If the RFDS wasn't available in Western Australia, I can imagine people would be hesitant to work in isolated areas where work opportunities are available."

Last year, while working as part of a cattle mustering team on the station, Ben witnessed firsthand the lifesaving work of the RFDS: a contractor was gored in the thigh by a bull, after a momentary slip-up.

"The experience really cemented in my mind the need to support the RFDS and that my contributions are ensuring the service is available well into the future, for the benefit of all West Australians."

Fond Farewell

Last year, we bade farewell to two of our longstanding and respected team members, former Director of Medical Services Professor Stephen Langford and Senior Engineer Greg Turner.

PROFESSOR STEPHEN LANGFORD

When Stephen joined the RFDS in 1983, it was the beginning of a 35-year career dedicated to ensuring that West Australians living in regional and remote areas had access to essential health care.

He was appointed Director of Medical Services in 1985, and during his service he was instrumental in introducing countless medical and technological innovations that have enabled the RFDS to remain at the forefront of aero medical care.

He also played a vital role in acquiring the Rio Tinto LifeFlight Hawker jet in 2008, enabling RFDS teams to reach and treat critically ill patients faster.

In 2016, Dr Langford was awarded Western Australia's Local Hero of the Year, in recognition of his 32-year-long contribution to the RFDS and the people and communities of WA.

At Stephen's farewell, RFDS Western Ops Chair Sam Walsh said: "You have been a loyal and passionate advocate for our people, our organisation and its mission. We wish you all the best as you embark on a new chapter in your life. You will always be valued for your significant contribution in shaping this organisation."



SENIOR ENGINEER GREG TURNER

After a 25-year career with the RFDS, Senior Engineer Greg Turner decided it was time to hang up his boots in December last year.

Looking back at his time with the RFDS, Greg said he had witnessed dramatic changes, including the installation of new infrastructure and the evolution of the Western Operations fleet – from piston-engine aircraft on short hops right through to the jet age.

"I'm very proud to have worked alongside some of the best engineers," he said. "Some of them I've worked with for more than 20 years and will be my friends for life."

RIO TINTO SEES RFDS INTO NEXT GENERATION SERVICE

In 2008, Rio Tinto asked its Iron Ore employees what mattered most to them and what initiatives they would like the business to support.

The overwhelming response was ensuring health equality for all West Australians and supporting the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

Since then, the partnership has seen RFDS shift into the jet age with the introduction of the Rio Tinto LifeFlight Hawker 800XP jet in 2009 – the mining giant investing nearly \$12 million to enable the purchase, medical fit-out and operational costs during its decade-long tenure.

Further boosting the partnership in 2018, Rio Tinto has committed \$10 million over the next four years to fund RFDS' acquisition and fit-out of two Pilatus PC-24 jets – a world first for aero medical service.

The LifeFlight PC-24 jet aircraft boasts a top speed of 815km per hour, has the capacity to carry three stretchered patients and two medical teams and can land on rough airstrips.

In December last year, Rio Tinto Pilbara Mines Managing Director Stefan Buys, together with RFDS CEO Rebecca Tomkinson, witnessed and welcomed the historic arrival of the Rio Tinto LifeFlight PC-24 jet to Western Australia at Broome International Airport.

Mr Buys, speaking to a gathering of Rio Tinto and RFDS staff at arrival events held at both the Broome and Jandakot bases, said: "Technology plays a big part in our business so we're



especially proud to have supported the delivery of these new state-of-the-art PC-24 jet aircraft which will help the RFDS continue to serve regional and remote communities across the state."

Ms Tomkinson said RFDS is proud of its partnership with Rio Tinto which continues to grow to benefit all West Australians.

"This project would not have been possible without Rio Tinto's foresight and their courage," she said.

"Our partnership together delivers on our shared values of innovation, tenacity and that can-do Australian spirit."

ISLA'S NEW SPONSORS HELP KEEP GOLDFIELDS SAFE

The Goldfields region just became a little safer, thanks to a one-million-dollar sponsorship deal that will keep our newest PC-12 turboprop aircraft 'Isla' in the air.

The Goldfields Children's Charity (GCC) and the Shire of Leonora last year entered into a joint five-year sponsorship agreement with RFDS, contributing towards the aircraft's operational costs.

GCC and the Shire of Leonora will each contribute \$100,000 a year for the term of the agreement, which is the first of its kind for the RFDS.

The Shire of Leonora has recognised through this partnership that the RFDS is an essential health service provider to the region and the Shire's contribution will ensure the longevity of these services.

The PC-12 aircraft, named 'Isla' after a new character in the children's television show, Thomas the Tank Engine – will be based in Kalgoorlie when possible. Over the past decade, the Flying Doctor has retrieved nearly 12,000 patients from the Goldfields.

The Goldfields region has a large concentration of mining operations, heavy volumes of traffic on the roads, including road trains and other traffic crossing the Nullarbor Plain, as well as thousands of residents in towns as remote as Leonora and Esperance.

FUNDRAISING EVENTS



OUTBACK AIR RACE

19TH – 31ST AUGUST 2018

The 2018 Outback Air Race, sponsored by the Classic Safari Company, saw a record field of 40 light aircraft, pilots and their passengers raise nearly \$513,000 for the RFDS nationally.

Attracting teams from across the country and internationally, participants travelled 4000km from Archerfield Airport in Queensland to Broome, Western Australia over 12 days.

Race manager Stuart Payne said it was fantastic to have the event fully subscribed as the RFDS celebrated 90 years of service in Australia.

“This event provides competitors with a unique opportunity to raise much needed funds for Australia’s most iconic charity and to see the beauty of outback Australia from light aircraft,” Stuart said.

“Participants had the opportunity to visit outback centres and meet new people there, people who were so appreciative of the life-saving service the RFDS delivers.”

Participants travelled through towns including Bundaberg, Longreach, Mount Isa, Adele Grove, Daly Waters, Katherine and Kununurra.

The Outback Air Race, run every three years, is a GPS navigation time-trial where pilots are scored based on their ability to predict the time taken to fly each leg, and their accuracy at flying over visual start and finish points.



THE GREAT SANDY CAMEL TREK

In May last year, Perth friends Steve Choate and Anthony Goyder embarked on an epic camel trek, crossing the Great Sandy Desert in a 1200-kilometre, 40-day marathon effort to raise funds for the Flying Doctor.

Anthony, a descendant of the famous explorer Peter Egerton Warburton, said the pilgrimage was partly a tribute to his ancestor. In 1872 Egerton Warburton successfully led an expedition of seven men and 17 camels from Adelaide across the arid centre of Australia to the coast of WA, via Alice Springs.

Having no prior animal handling experience, both Steve and Anthony spent more than a year learning how to train wild camels under the tutelage of Calamunnda Camel Farm owner Chris O’Hora.

The men began their trek at the top of Canning Stock Route, then travelled south for 600 km before heading up into the Great Sandy Desert for another 600 km and finishing at Eighty Mile Beach on the coast of WA.

When Anthony’s employer, Macquarie Bank, learnt of his journey, the company decided to match the duo’s fundraising efforts – bringing the total amount raised for the RFDS to around \$17,000.

IGA PERTH ROYAL SHOW

The Royal Flying Doctor Service was delighted to have been invited to showcase its work at the 2018 IGA Perth Royal Show, held at the Claremont Showgrounds in September.

More than 500 dirt-covered athletes took on the 2018 Pilbara Mud Run to raise funds for their Flying Doctor. Held at the Port Hedland Motorcycle Club track, the event attracted competitors from Port Hedland, Karratha, Newman, Tom Price and Broome. The 4km course featured monkey bars, rope climbs, mudslides, tyres, flooded tunnels, hay bales, inflatable obstacles, net crawls and numerous deep bog pits. Organisers said the event was an excellent opportunity for residents and non-residents to come together to socialise.



WORLDFLIGHT PERTH

In November 2018, a team of Perth-based pilots and aircraft enthusiasts took part in the global WorldFlight challenge – a nonstop, week-long, virtual flight around the world in state-of-the-art 737 and 747 aircraft simulators.

Held in the first week of November each year, crews visit 45 airports and cover some 40,000 nautical miles. The Perth WorldFlight team raised \$12, 248 in 2018 and plans to beat the record in 2019.
